Authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Park Service's National Register of Historic Places is part of a national program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect America's historic and archeological resources.

"The unimpaired authenticity of a property's historic or prehistoric identity, evidenced by surviving physical characteristics"

Significance

Properties:

- **A.** That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- **B.** That are associated with the lives of significant persons in or past; or
- **C.** That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- **D.** That have yielded or may be likely to yield, information important in history or prehistory.



Architecture

The building is of major significance to the religious history of Raleigh because it was built by the first independent black congregation formed in Raleigh to house their expanded Membership....

One of the best known of St. Paul's ministers was the Rev. R. W. H. Leak, pastor during the 1880s and 1890s during the time that he became a prominent leader for black Republicans and edited the Outlook, the second Negro newspaper in Raleigh.

b. A building or structure removed from its original location but which is primarily significant for architectural value, or which is the surviving structure most importantly associated with a historic person or event; or



c. A birthplace or grave of a historical figure of outstanding importance if there is no appropriate site or building associated with his or her productive life; or

City Cemetery meets Criterion A for its statewide significance in social history as one of the earliest municipal cemeteries in North Carolina. It is one of the few municipal cemeteries that provided space for African Americans.

City Cemetery holds statewide significance under Criterion C for one of the finest collections of nineteenth century funerary sculpture in North Carolina.

e. A reconstructed building when accurately executed in a suitable environment and presented in a dignified manner as part of a restoration master plan, and when no other building or structure with the same association has survived; or

f. A property primarily commemorative in intent if design, age, tradition, or symbolic value has invested it with its own exceptional significance; or





TUESDAY, MAY 28, 1935.



RALEIGH (363 alt., 37,379 pop.), the capital of North Carolina, was made to order in a wooded wilderness on a Piedmont hill near the geographical center of the State. In the center of the city is oak-shaded Capitol Square, covering 6 acres and dominated by the stately old Capitol Building. Surrounded by State departmental buildings, the square forms a hub from which the principal streets radiate.

Of the four squares set aside for parks in the quarters of the original town plan two survive: Nash on the southwest, still a park, and Moore on the southeast, used as a produce market. Caswell Square, on the northwest, is occupied by the State Board of Health buildings. Burke Square, on the northeast, contains the Governor's mansion.
